BOOKS as BRIDGES

BY INT'L BOOK PROJECT



Books as Bridges enrolled 60 classrooms in 2012 and empowered 840 students to complete a service learning project.

IBP's Books as Bridges program has grown and adapted to provide educational and rewarding experiences for students throughout Central Kentucky as well as for our partners overseas. In recent years, IBP has responded to the increased demand for service learning opportunities among middle and high school students, particularly projects that involve the local community while addressing global concerns. Books as Bridges grew to include the Ambassadors for Change program in 2012, giving Kentucky middle and high school students the opportunity to undertake a year-long service learning project with a community overseas.

Through this new program, students researched partner countries, collected books, solicited donations, and volunteered hundreds of hours to send more than 30,000 books over the last school year.

LOCAL IMPACT

Part of IBP's mission is to provide adequate resources for those in need in the United States. After tornadoes ravaged much of Eastern Kentucky, IBP responded swiftly in order to replenish libraries and schools affected by this tragedy.

In 2012, IBP continued to forge new partnerships while maintaining existing relationships to provide books throughout the US. Donated books that are more appropriate for American culture are designated for projects that either rebuild community libraries or help children become life-long learners by encouraging and enabling book ownership at a young age.

IBP donated 4,366 books to 20 organizations in Kentucky and throughout the US in 2012.

IT TAKES A VILLAGE

Mpongwe, Zambia

Some of the most rewarding projects the International Book Project takes on involve the cooperation of like-minded individuals and organizations that share the same passion for equal access to education. Two years ago IBP accepted two schools as small shipment and Books as Bridges partners with the assistance of Allison Harnish, a Ph.D. student at the University of Kentucky. As part of her academic work, Harnish lived in Zambia where she conducted research on population displacement in the southern part of the country. While there, she made an effort to connect IBP with communities that needed the most assistance.

After returning to the US, Allison met with IBP to begin the process of sending a large shipment to the communities where she lived and worked. To make the most of the opportunity, IBP connected Allison's communities with other IBP partners, including NGOs run by Zambians, American volunteers, and US embassy affiliates. The collaboration between NGOs and local community members was pivotal to the success of the shipment, which provided over 20,000 books to students throughout the country. It is these projects that truly bring to light an old African proverb, "If you want to go quickly, go alone. If you want to go far, go together."



With every project IBP undertakes, we place a high emphasis on community involvement. This project's success is owed to the cooperation of partners in Zambia.

TAKING THAT FIRST STEP


Child Aid, Guatemala

For most children in the developing world, learning to read represents that crucial first step on the pathway out of poverty. In a country like Guatemala where over 50% of indigenous children never complete primary school, the power of literacy is continuously evident in daily life. With the lowest literacy rate in Latin America, it is estimated that each year of school completed by a child in Guatemala results in an astonishing 13% increase in annual income. In addition to the practicality of literacy in indigenous communities throughout Guatemala, there also exists a fundamentally humanistic element. Reading develops a child's imagination to dream of worlds outside of his own. It is this evidence that compels organizations like Child Aid, a US-based NGO, to administer its flagship literacy program *Reading for Life* in Guatemala.

Through a five-year partnership, the International Book Project has provided close to 150,000 books to Child Aid. One of very few organizations that recognizes the need to provide books in local languages in the early learning years, IBP continues to provide Child Aid with books in Spanish. In 2012 IBP worked closely with the organization to send a sea container of over 50,000 books to be used in a number of programs that not only provide educational resources for children, but also to rural teachers. Child Aid's *Reading for Life* program fosters literacy skills and encourages a love and habit of reading, a practice critical to educational development.



Through Reading for Life, Child Aid helps more than 9,500 children in over 50 villages improve their lives through education. Each year, they help hundreds of teachers in remote villages to more effectively teach children to read. Through a partnership with IBP, Child Aid delivers tens of thousands of children's books to neglected schools and libraries.



Cash Expenses




Note:




